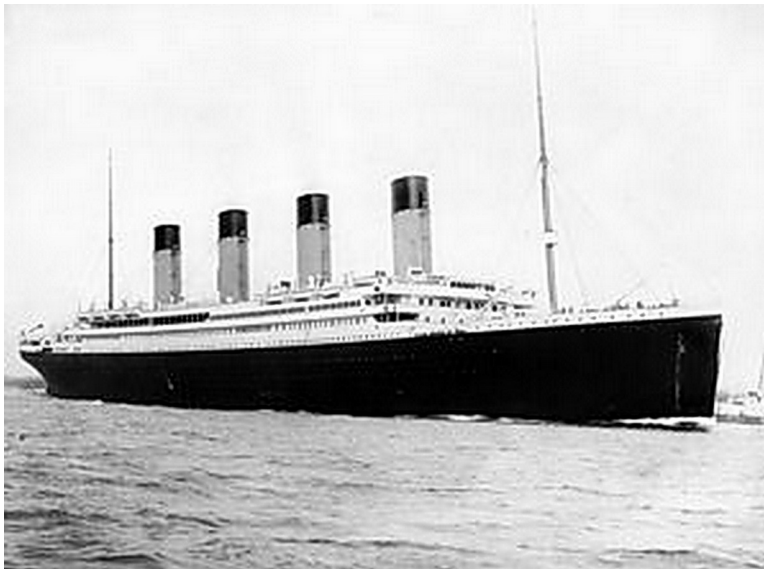


FOREVERMORE ON CEDAR HILL

CEMETERY, 1912 - 2012



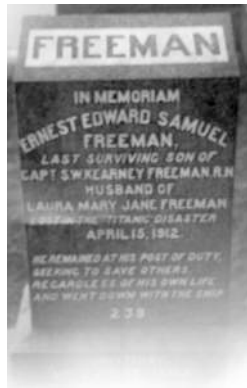

As we all know the 100 years anniversary of the sinking of the RMS Titanic was April 15, 2012. The great 'unsinkable' luxury ocean liner, carrying 2,223 passengers, left for its maiden voyage on April 10, 1912 across the North Atlantic Ocean from Southampton, England. Passengers included some of the world's wealthiest people and thousands of emigrants from England, Ireland and other parts of Europe. After making several 'port of calls' it continued to New York City. Of course, it did not make it after the great ship hit an iceberg at 11:40 pm 375 miles south of Newfoundland. The accident caused the death of 1,514 people. Days later, bodies washed up on shore of Nova Scotia. The local peoples came to them, prepared them and buried them in local cemeteries, most at the Fairview Lawn Cemetery at the north end of Halifax. 123 of the lost souls are buried there. The graves are situated in a shape of a hull of a ship. There are nineteen souls buried at the Roman Catholic Mount Olivet Cemetery and ten more at the Jewish Baron de Hirsch Cemetery.

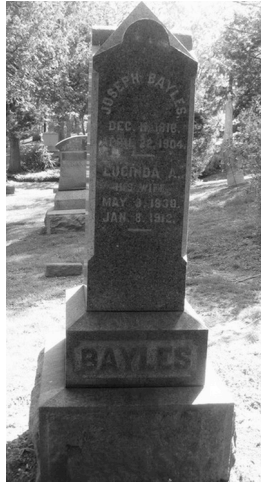
[Some of the 123 stones that are erected at Fairview Lawn Cemetery]

CEDAR HILL'S 1912 INTERMENTS

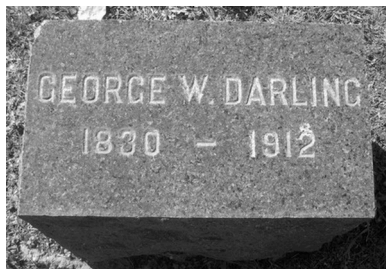

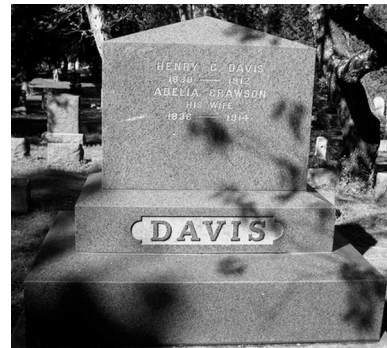

Every year since 1959, there has been a '100 years anniversary' for some of our residents here at Cedar Hill. Furthermore, there are some who celebrated 150 years. Some time ago, Cedar Hill celebrated 150 years anniversary with a 'Wine & Cheese' Evening and a tour of the cemetery with actors portraying some of our famous and founding families who are interred here. 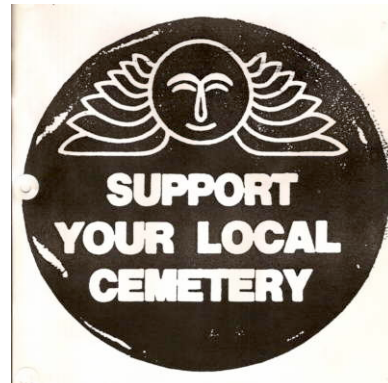

'Mary B., Wife of Charles L. Hulse , died May 27, 1859; Ae. 19 yrs. 3 mos. & 3 days' was the first actual burial at Cedar Hill. Joseph Bayles. Jr. [infant] and Conklin Miles [with four other family members] were re-interred at Cedar Hill later.

Writer's post script:

Please note that there are burials older than 1859 here. These were, however, transported from local private graveyards in the Port Jefferson area and other areas and were brought to Cedar Hill as other family members were interred.
