R OCKVILLE CENTRE is a thriving ciliage of about thirty-five hundred inhabitants, incorporated in 1893 and is located some nineteen miles from New York City Hall, just beyond the city limits. It is situated on the Montauk Division of the Long Island Railroad, and is the first stop made by express trains from New York. A large portion of the all the year-round residents are New York business men, who own and occupy their own homes and commute daily, thereby proving that Rockville Centre is not only a delightful, but a convenient, place for the city man to reside.

The village owns and operates its own water system and obtains its supply from deep artesian wells, which provide the best of pure water. The supply is very plentiful and the water rents are very low. The electric lighting system, also owned and operated by the village, is modern and provides excellent illumination for the streets and residences at a very reasonable expense:

The famous Merrick road, so popular with the automobilists, runs through the village and brings thousands of admiring visitors weekly. The entrance to the Long Island Motor Parkway, the greatest automobile race course in the world, is only a few miles distant. The stop at Rockville Centre for rest and refreshment is always popular. From here are good roads to Far Rockaway, Rockaway Beach, Hempstead, Garden City, Mineola, Oyster Bay, etc. Rockville Centre is the nearest village to Long Beach. There is no end of opportunity to enjoy life and health in this section, with Rockville Centre as the home place.

In Summer there is terms and golf, boating, bathing, fishing, driving, motoring, etc—everything to interest attention and please. The Rockville Centre Termis Club is widely known for its amateur, professional and social lights. In Winter there is bowling, killiards and the indoor sports; courses of lectures, musical entertainments, and many social events, all of which make Rockville Centre attractive for a visit, sojourn or residence.

The village is governed by a Board of Trustees elected by and directly responsible to the people. The 4 st president of the board was John Lyon, who was succeeded by Chas. W. Hayes, there

Edwin D. Seabury. The present incumbent, George W. Smith, has been at the head of affairs for the last ten years, and with his associate trustees has kept Rockville Centre abreast of the times.

The business men's organization is known as the Rockville Centre Board of Trade, and is a very active, enthusiastic body of representative men, all deeply concerned in the welfare and progress of their village. Every opportunity to advance the material interests of Rockville Centre is carefully considered and suggestions are always in order. The board consists of ninety active members and holds monthly meetings. The present officers are: Alonzo W. Fisk, president; Treadwell D. Carpenter, vice-president; Dr. D. N. Bulson, treasurer, and William H. Grim, secretary.

The committee on publications, including this illustrated booklet, consists of Edwin G. Wright, William Richensteen and Alonzo W. Fisk. These men represent the entire community in their desire to spread abroad the many home making attractions of Rockville Centre, in which this booklet will be useful, for it is filled with facts only, is actual pictures of beautiful homes, all representative of many others which could not be included owing to lack of space. One special project now before the board is that of improving Mill River, so that navigation can be brought up from the ocean and vachts can sail up to the Merrick Road at Rockville Centre. This will add greatly to the many Summer attractions, The section through which this stream runs is high ground, well drained, healthful and very desirable for residences.



## Some Facts About Rockville Centre

Schools are under the supervision of the Regents of the University of the State of New York, kindergarten, primary, grammar and high schools. Free text book system. The advantages of the Regents high school need not be dwell upon.

Gas for cooking or for illumination, if desired, is furnished at reason able rates by the Nassau and Suffolk Lighting Company.

Churches: Methodist, Baptist, Roman Catholic, Episcopal, Presbyteriau, Lutheran and Christian Science.

Stores and Markels of the best and up to date. With eight grocery, four fruit and vegetable, three meat markets, two large dry goods and department stores, several other dry goods stores, hardware stores, thoroughly up to date deficatessen, confectionery, three bakerles and other stores usually found in a large and thriving village. Shopping can be done to us good advantage at home as in the city; still, if one desires to shop in the city, all of the large department stores maintain wagons and defiver goods free of charge.

Fraternal Societies: Masonic, I. O. O. F. Knights of Pythias, Junior Order of American Mechanics, Red Men, Daughters of Liberty and Royal Accanum.

Banks: The Rank of Rockelle Centre, with deposits of upwards of \$1,200,000.00 is the most prosperous bank of the same capital of any in the State of New York. The First National Bank is a new institution, but is doing well.

Hullding Loan Association has been organized some fifteen years and has never fatied to pay a dividend. It is managed by local business men and is in a splendid and sound condition.

Transportation: Rockville Centre is on the Montank Division of the Long Island Railroad, nineteen miles from New York; is the first stop for the express trains and averages twenty five trains daily; the running time from New York is from thirty-five to forty-five minutes, according to trains. Commutation fare is \$7.70 per month.

A trolley line is now in operation to Brooklyn, and another is in course of construction from Patchogue to Blackwell's Island Bridge. This last trolley is to be a high speed trolley and is to run through Lakeview avenue. On completion, the fare to Manhattan cannot exceed ten cents.

Telephone Service: Central office of the New York and New Jersey Telephon. Company, low local rates and reasonable rates to New York and Brooklyn. Scarcely a home, now but has a telephone. More telephones in Rockville Centre than any other village on Long Island.

Police: A small but adequate uniformed police force. Officer always at hand on call at the central office,






